PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Welcome to all of the SFVMA members to my inaugural presidential letter. If I may quote Queen Elizabeth; if 2017 was an "annus horribilis" (without consulting my Google translator, I believe this to mean a horrible year) then welcome to 2018 and hopefully a fresh new start. If your year was a great or even a good year then you may well have discovered the secret to happiness and in turn can teach it to others.

Evidence is growing that the connection between a sense of well-being and physical health is real. Although the concept of happiness is a much discussed area of interest, more and more it has become a topic for serious academic research. In the constant search for what we think brings us happiness or joy, apparently we are making it even more difficult in obtaining it.

Here's a few ideas about what apparently makes us happy.

Buying things doesn't make us happy but buying experiences maximizes happiness so says Michael Norton (associate professor of business administration at Harvard) and co-author of Happy Money: The Science of Smarter Spending. Research shows that people who purchase concert tickets or yoga lessons or a dinner out are happier than those who buy possessions. The difference apparently is the social interaction. People tend to achieve significantly more pleasure when there is social bonding.

What determines happiness? Genetic studies suggest that about half of our propensity to be happy is inherited. Does money or looks make a difference to our ability? Very little, it seems. It contributes the least (less than 10% in one study). What makes a big difference however is determined by our own choices such as choosing to be happy, exercising, getting outside, sleeping more, having "me" time, socializing and being generous with your time.

Helping others and giving back to the community works in two ways. Volunteering provides both a sense of purpose and social interaction. And so, if you have read this far then here comes the crunch. I would encourage all of the members, myself included to raise your hands when we ask for volunteers for the spey and vaccination clinics this year. It will make you both healthier and happier.

ALERT: CANINE INFLUENZA OUTBREAK

UPDATE — **February 9, 2018:** The SFVMA now has reports of two confirmed cases of canine influenza in San Francisco. Both dogs were boarded in facilities in the South Bay and are being quarantined at home. We will continue to update this page as we receive reports.

There is currently an outbreak of canine influenza going on in the South Bay. We do not yet have any cases to report to the Veterinary Medical Association in San Francisco. The following information has been provided by Dr. Valerie Brons:

In the South Bay over 50 coughing dogs have been seen at two emergency clinics in the past week; so far at least three of their patients have tested positive for canine influenza H3N2.

A canine respiratory panel (that specifically tests for H3N8 and H3N2) is recommended if a dog is coughing and/or has a fever. There can be some false negatives on this test.

It is recommended to vaccinate unaffected dogs who will be exposed to other dogs (boarding, shows, dog park, grooming, or if they have been exposed to any dog that is coughing etc.) with the new H3N2/H3N8 influenza vaccine. This is a series of 2 vaccines given 3 weeks apart. If the dog is already coughing, it is too late for the vaccine to be effective.



Influenza-infected dogs are thought to have immunity for 2 years once they have recovered.

For any affected dogs treatment is symptomatic since this is a viral infection, however bacterial co-infection and pneumonia is possible and bloodwork and x-rays are recommended in addition to the respiratory panel. An antibiotic may or may not be recommended on a case by case basis.

Testing is available through multiple laboratories and can take 3-14 days for results depending on the specific test and lab.

The good news is, so far, treated cases have not been fatal, and overall this virus has high morbidity low mortality.

LATEST NEWS FROM SFAfA

Don't forget **San Francisco Aid for Animals** when you have a client in need of financial assistance. We have three programs in 2018 to assist you. Our Grant-in Aid Program has already provided almost \$30,000 in funding to help 53 pets so far this fiscal year. Together with matching services donated by hospitals it has resulted in over \$60,000 in life-saving care. Many participating hospitals that signed up for this year's program still have funds remaining so please encourage your hospital to use all funds before the June 15 deadline.

When you are working on a larger case where anticipated costs are higher think about the **Ingrid Tauber Fund for Animals**. In 2017 the TFA provided over \$45,000 in funds and helped 13 pets. Funding

of up to \$5000 per case will be considered and the hospital needs only to provide a 25% matching donation of in-kind services or discounts. Any veterinarian may apply for 2018 TFA funds. Finally, the **Ingrid Tauber Fire Fund for Animals** was established to help victims of the Northern California wildfires in October. This one-time fund provides immediate and follow up care to any animal and their owners who were impacted in any way by the fires. This fund has just over \$7000 left and is available to any hospital with no match required. Please contact us for details.
