# SFVMA PRESIDENT'S LETTER

Part of the preparation for these quarterly SFVMA meetings is reaching out to the sponsors to confirm their support and attendance. One of those sponsors who has been incredibly gracious with her time and financial support is Sharon Burns from Nationwide. Thank you to Sharon and please say hello to her at the meeting. That got me to thinking how little I knew about the pet insurance industry and how rapidly it has grown. More importantly, the likelihood is that it will grow significantly over the next few years.

Over the last five years, increasing consumer awareness and the diversity of products has benefited the Pet Insurance sector. The latest available statistics tell us that 30% of pets in Sweden and 23% of pets in the United Kingdom have health insurance. In the United States it is between 1% and 2% and yet this figures continues to increase and the prediction is for continued industry growth. Why is there this massive difference in the percentage of insured animals when comparing US to Sweden and UK?

#### HISTORY OF PET INSURANCE

Pet health insurance has been around for about 130 years old. The first policy was written in 1890 by Claes Virgin, founder of Länsförsäkrings Alliance, a Swedish Insurance company which is still around today. The original policies covered horses and livestock. In 1924, that company insured the first dog in Sweden. By 1947, the first pet insurance policy was sold in Britain.

Founded in 2007, the North American Pet Health Insurance Association (NAPHIA) is a group that represents more than 20 different pet insurance brands currently in the US and Canada. Approximately 1.6 million pets are insured by the various pet insurance companies. The estimate is that there are about 180 million pets in the North America. That

rounds out to about 9% of all North Americans cats and dogs being covered by pet insurance. It was not until 1982 that the first dog was insured in USA and it was notable signing... Lassie of television.

- **1890** The first pet insurance policy is written by Claes Virgin, founder of Länsförsäkrings Alliance.
- **1924** The first dog receives insurance coverage in Sweden.
- **1947** Britain starts issuing pet insurance policies.
- 1980 Veterinary Pet Insurance (VPI) was the first company to offer pet health insurance in North Americ. Nationwide was VPI's underwriter since it was founded and then acquired the company outright in 2009.
- 1982 Lassie receives the first pet insurance policy in the United States, issued by Veterinary Pet Insurance (VPI).
- 1989 Pet health insurance is introduced to Canada by the companies Petplan, MediPet and Petsure.
- 2007 The North American Pet Health Insurance Association (NAPHIA) is founded to establish and maintain standards for the pet health insurance industry.
- 2010 Healthy Paws Pet Insurance enrolled its first pet in February 2010.

I have to add some personal bias here with the addition of some Australian statistics. Australia has more pets per capita than any other country in the world. There are 29 million pets with a population of 25 million people. Although pet insurance in Australia has been around for only 15 years, over 26% of households with dogs have pet insurance and 19% of cats are insured. With a population of just over 25 million people they spend about \$2,2 billion per year on health and \$490 million on insurance (2018)

How does this compare to the United States? According to the 2019-20 American Pet Products Association (APPA) National Pet Owners Survey, 84.9 million, or 67%, of families in the U.S. reported owning a pet, and spent an estimated \$18.98 billion on vet care alone in 2019, up from \$18.11 billion in actual costs in 2018. This is not a new trend; consumer spending on pet medical care has been consistently rising every year since 2001, the year APPA officially started collecting data. The rise in veterinary care spending comes at a time when sales of pet insurance policies are rising, as well. Highlights from the North American Pet Health Insurance Association (NAPHIA) 2019 State of the **Industry Report** show the total number of pets insured in 2018 reached 2.43 million, up by almost 17.1% from 2017.

There is an interesting fact that I found when researching data for pet ownership in this country and pet insurance and that is the numbers do vary significantly depending on who conducted the survey. The bottom line is that pet industries care less about the number of animals but they do care what the consumer buys and for how much. Google the U.S. pet population, and you're quickly confronted with two oft-cited, and contradictory, sources. The American Pet Products Association (APPA) found that **68 percent** of U.S. households owned some sort of pet in 2016 — "equal to the highest level ever reported," it gushed in the executive summary. Among those pets were about 90 million dogs and 94 million cats, the group said.

The American Veterinary Medical Association, by contrast, recently reported that **57 percent of households** had a pet at the end of 2016, a figure the group characterized as having

only "inched up" from its previous survey in 2011. The overall pet population, AVMA said, included 77 million dogs and 58 million cats — significantly lower than what the pet trade group cited. It turns out there are other, stronger data from surveys that don't appear at the top of search engines, and they show far lower pet ownership rates than the pet industry group's record high figures. The Simmons National Consumer Study, which surveys households annually, found last year that 53 percent owned pets, figures that suggested at least 77 million dogs and 54 million cats, or about the same as the veterinary association.

So what is the level of pet insurance. According to the latest date from Department of Clinical Veterinary Science and the Pet Food Institute about 30% of animals are insured in Sweden, a similar number in Australia, 23% in UK and somewhere between 1% ad 2% are insured in USA. Why this difference? Clearly in Sweden and UK there is the historical perspective where insurance has been around for a long time but why the market penetration in Australia.

Mounting veterinary costs and consumer awareness of industry products are anticipated to benefit the Pet Insurance industry over the next five years. It is anticipated that growth will likely increase with projected increase in animal population. There is potential in stagnation of animal population with declining home ownership. However there is a lot of catch up to drive the growth when we compare other countries percentage of pet insurance. Whatever happens, again it is an interesting time for the veterinary profession.

## **RVT Students**





Volunteer Vet Techs do not need to be licensed vet techs, but must have a minimum of one year experience working in a veterinary environment, and feel comfortable performing animal restraint and animal handling tasks within a limited clinic environment.

Thousands of animals need care during and after disasters. Some 63% of California households have pets, including an estimated 10 million pet cats, nine million dogs, and one million horses. Other pets, farm



animals, and wildlife also need assistance during and after disasters like earthquakes, floods, and wildfires.

Veterinary professionals are vital to animals during disasters. The mission of the California Veterinary Medical Reserve Corps (CAVMRC) is to provide veterinary professionals with the training and credentialing necessary to support animal health and public health.

Deployment is always voluntary. Volunteers get involved at whatever level works for them – assistants are needed as well as leaders, part-time responders are as welcome as those who can help out for a week or two, plus there are ongoing roles in areas such as planning and disaster response. Volunteer participation can be a matter of life or death for rescued animals and means the world to the owners of those animals.

#### **BENEFITS OF JOINING THE CAVMRC**

The CAVMRC provides veterinary professionals:

- Credentialing necessary to support animal health and public health emergency response.
- Continuing education and training opportunities that allow you to strengthen your skills to better serve your practice, your community and our state.
